Moritake Onsen was accidentally discovered in a rice field when hot water suddenly gushed out of the ground while drilling for oil in 1952. The onsen has continued to draw visitors ever since. Its weak alkaline, colorless, and transparent solution is famous for its saltiness. The nutrients in the water make it extremely good for the skin.



### Clay Flute

In 1982, a rare clay flute was discovered during the excavation of Takaishino ruins, a seaside settlement dating back to the late Jomon period.

### Moritake Kabuki



Moritake Kabuki is a local classical performing art that has been passed down for many generations. The origin of this tradition remains unclear following a great fire at

Hachiman Shrine in 1925 during which the records were sadly destroyed. Moritake Kabuki is estimated to have started during the Bunka or Bunsei periods between 1804 and 1830. It is said that long ago a monk became seriously ill while traveling. The monk stayed at a shrine and prayed while the villagers nursed him back to health. As a deep expression of his gratitude, the monk taught kabuki to the local people.


### Nakadate Bangaku



It is said that Nakadate Bangaku dates back to before the Edo period. It was introduced to local people from Nekko,

a part of Ani village. The tradition is upheld in Nakazawa and Tatemura villages in Kotooka. The performance originally had 24 acts, of which 7 have been preserved. Nakadate Bangaku can be enjoyed at the village community center during the Obon festival in August.
